Building Bridges for Families in Need

“On behalf of Rosa Hernandez and her entire family I would like to say thank you for your tremendous gift of love to this family in the most unique and unprecedented Christmas ever. I am a Student Success Coordinator with REAL Journey Academies. It is my job to identify families within our school community that may be experiencing a lack of resources and support as well as food insecurity and diminished quality of life. I have worked with this family in the past so when the opportunity to bless a family for Christmas was presented to me by **Debra Williams and Norma Spencer of Building Resilient Communities** I knew exactly how to help.

BRC wasted no time gathering vital information about the children and ascertained the need quickly. Within a few days I provided them with the age and gender of each child; along with shoe sizes and other important information. I must also say this all took place in a very short period of time but that did not deter our efforts. About two weeks later I was able to deliver six pairs of shoes, and 3 toys each for Rosa's children (5 boys and 1 girl) all under the age of 18. When I showed up at the apartment, mom was not there because she had to work, so grandma greeted me with a warm smile.

As we emptied the toys and shoes from the bags I carried, grandma could not hold back the tears that kept coming. Grandma spoke very little English, but she spoke clearly when she said, "thank you Mr. Powell, you are our angel." I am just the messenger was my response, but in truth **BRC and your partners are the real angels for this grateful family.**

Let me close this letter by saying we had one final act we accomplished for this family by the grace of God. The day after Thanksgiving the family's fully stocked refrigerator broke down so by the time, I came to the house it had been a couple weeks since they had a working refrigerator. I looked at it and determined that we would find one to replace the broken appliance. As God would have it, we were able to purchase a refurbished refrigerator less than a week after Christmas. Mom and the Children were overwhelmed that someone would do this for them. **I am grateful for the partnership with BRC.”**

Prepare Your Community — Resource Center



Evolving climate conditions throughout California have made wildfires a year-round concern to many communities. With about a quarter of Southern California Edison (SCE) customers residing in high-risk fire areas, addressing the prevention and mitigation of wildfires is a top priority. SCE has invested in a variety of improvements and innovations to help prevent wildfires and act quickly when they occur.

What is a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) event and how can we stay prepared?

During high-risk conditions for a wildfire, SCE may temporarily shut off power to your neighborhood. This can prevent an electric system from becoming a source of ignition. Proactive shutoffs are temporary and meant to keep you and your community safe. Learn more about PSPS and sign up for alerts [here](#).

SCE Customer Resources During a PSPS

SCE Community Crew Vehicles and Community Resource Centers are available to support customers during Public Safety Power Shutoffs. SCE observes physical distancing practices and provide Customer Resiliency Kits, which include PSPS information, light snacks, water, small resiliency devices, and personal protection equipment.
